




LPPL Celebrates 40 Years

The La Grange Park Public Library proudly celebrates our 40th anniversary this June. We have come a long way. It was in 1957 that residents approved the formation of the Library, but they did not get approval for tax support.

Not to be deterred, the Committee of Citizens formed in 1974 with the purpose of providing a library to the community. This time, the residents came through and approved a referendum to establish a library district for La Grange Park.

Beginning in August 1975, the Suburban Library System provided us with bookmobile service. The bookmobile made several stops weekly within the village, one of them being the Jewel parking

lot. A year later, on August 1, 1976, we rented 5,400 square feet of space from District 102 in the basement of the 'old' Forest Road School, now the Science Center at Barnsdale. It was a cozy spot, the place where I took my children for story hour in the '80s. At the time, our collection included 4,600 books and we circulated 51,000 items the first year.

We rapidly outgrew that space and in late 1987 a referendum was approved for a new building, our current building at 555 N. La Grange Road. The building was completed and on opening day, November 27, 1989, we circulated 1,132 items.

Today, our yearly circulation is 152,613 items with additional eBook circulation

of 6,973. With the changes in libraries, we now have much more than books in our collection: 76,883 books; 24,319 audio items; 3,509 audio downloadable titles; 6,467 videos and DVDs; 117 downloadable DVDs and videos; 172 periodical subscriptions; eBooks now total 22,820 and we have 31 licensed databases.

Watch for special events in June as we celebrate our 40th! There will be something for everyone. For local history buffs, we have scrapbooks and files documenting the birth and growth of our beloved Library. Please inquire at the Reference Desk.



March 17 *Howards End* by E. M. Forster

The Big Read program is now ReDiscover! The theme for 2015 is Celebrating Home. Our Library has selected *Howards End* for our book discussion.

The author described his last novel of the Edwardian era as “primarily a hunt for a home.” *Howards End* is the story of a charming old country house and which of two families will inherit it. This classic is as relevant today as it was when it was first published in 1910.

April 21 *Destiny of the Republic: A Tale of Madness, Medicine and Murder of a President* by Candice Millard

This nonfiction book is a dual biography of the 20th U. S. President and his assassin Charles Guiteau. James Garfield rose from poverty to become a teacher, Union army general, and admired congressman. He was shot by a deranged office seeker just four months after the inauguration. This engaging book is an insightful look at the political and scientific developments of late nineteenth-century America.

May 19 *Us* by David Nicholls

This wise and witty novel is part travelogue and part personal history. Douglas Petersen schemes to win back his wife of 25 years and repair his strained relationship with his teen-aged son while on a European tour.

Does spring fever have you spring cleaning? Are your bookshelves overflowing? Drop off any gently used books, magazines, or movies at the Friends' Bookshop on the first floor of the Library and pick up some treasures to take back home.

The 77 libraries in the SWAN consortium, including La Grange Park, are gearing up for a switchover in April to a new online catalog called Enterprise. Patrons will be able to view eBook holds and checkouts, place holds, freeze holds and pay fines. Patrons can also indicate how they prefer to be notified when materials arrive, whether by phone, e-mail, text, or paper. These new features will enhance the user experience and make things easier for those who regularly use the catalog.

Most importantly, the new SWAN catalog allows for more intuitive searching, as well as eBook and online resource integration. With intuitive searching, patrons will get recommended titles and receive results the way they would expect, resembling the familiarity of popular internet search engines. For eBook and audiobook lovers, this new catalog provides a seamless combination. A patron can view the downloadable resources that are checked out to his or her account, search for all digital holdings in the catalog and

then download these materials without having to leave the catalog. This advanced system will also offer additional value to patrons with mobile apps and social media integration.

Rest assured, all participating libraries will have staff trained to help members with the new system, as well as print and online instructions to ease the transition. Keep an eye on our enewsletter, call, or visit the Library for help with the new catalog.

Important dates:

April 11-13: The Library will need to check books out manually, so please be sure to have your library card with you as we will be unable to access your account without it. The online catalog will still be available for searching. Due dates will be extended so you can keep your books longer while we make the switch.

April 14: Planned switchover date. Once the new catalog is up and running, patrons will need to reset the PIN on their account.
